### Summer Reading Suggestions

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**Please note: The listed books are only suggestions. No titles are required for reading and no child will be expected to read from the list. Books listed are chosen from a variety of sources. They include a wide variety of interests and a range of reading levels. Enjoy your summer!**

## IDEAS FOR MAKING YOUR CHILD A LIFE-LONG LOVER OF BOOKS

Picking up a book and reading for pleasure makes our minds grow. But some kids struggle with reading and for parents this can be very frustrating. Here are some things to keep in mind on ways to turn a young reader's reluctance into enthusiasm:

- **Encourage your child to read for fun, let them read books they enjoy.** Forcing a child to read books that are either not interesting or too difficult will only discourage them from reading. Use their interests and hobbies as starting points.
- **Don't rule out magazines!** The short, content-based articles are often written at an easy reading level and will spark their interest in a variety of topics. Most bookstore chains have a huge selection of magazines to appeal to almost every interest.
- **Read aloud to children of all ages.** There is no age cutoff for reading aloud. The pleasure of listening to you read, rather than struggling alone, may restore your child's initial enthusiasm for books and reading. Pick a story that the whole family can enjoy together!
- **Remember audiobooks!** Long car trips are a great time for the family to listen to a book together. Pick the first book in a series to spark the children's interest in reading the rest of the books themselves.
- **Set aside a regular time for reading in your family.** This should be independent of schoolwork—the 20 minutes before lights out, just after dinner, or whatever fits into your household schedule. As little as 10 minutes of free reading a day can help improve your child's skills and habits.
- **Notice what attracts your children's attention, even if they only look at the pictures.** Then build on that interest; read a short selection aloud, or simply bring home more information on the same subject.
- **Take your children to the library regularly.** Explore the children's section together. Ask a librarian to suggest books and magazines your children might enjoy.
- **Treat your children to an evening of laughter and entertainment featuring books!** Many children (parents, too) regard reading as a serious activity. A joke book, a story told in riddles, or a funny passage read aloud can reveal another side of reading.
- **Read Yourself.** Be a good role model and let your child see you reading. Share your excitement with the whole family.

- **Limit your children's television/technology viewing** in an effort to make time for other activities, such as reading. But never use technology as a reward for reading, or a punishment for not reading.

### Picture Books Title - Author

**It's Only Stanley** - Jon Agee. Stanley the dog makes mysterious noises in the night. What is he up to?

**Miss Nelson Is Missing** - Harry Allard. The children in Miss Nelson's class go beyond misbehaving; they are downright terrible! Near her wits' end, Miss Nelson thinks up a brilliant plan. The next day the kids have a substitute--the nasty Viola Swamp--who loads the boys and girls with homework and never gives them a story hour. By the time Miss Nelson finally returns, the children are so grateful they behave well. But now Viola Swamp is missing....

**A Day at the Market** - Sara Anderson. Set in the halls of Seattle's fabled Pike Place Market - rhyming picture book about farmers' market scenes from morning to night.

**Tap Tap Boom Boom** - Elizabeth Bluemle. When a thunderstorm hits a city street, children and grown-ups dash to the subway for shelter — and an impromptu friendly gathering.

**Children Make Terrible Pets (Starring Lucille Beatrice Bear)** - Peter Brown. Lucy, a bear, finds a young boy impossible to train as a pet.

**Mr. Tiger Goes Wild** - Peter Brown. Bored with city life, Mr. Tiger gets a wild idea.

**Franklin Goes to School** - Paulette Bourgeois. With his new pencil case packed with a ruler, eraser and 12 colored pencils, Franklin is ready for his first day of school -- until it's time to board the bus.

**The Mitten** - Jan Brett. Nicki drops his white mitten and animals crawl into it without him noticing.

**Sunflower House** - Eve Bunting. Inventive children plant summer fun.

**The Little House** - Virginia Lee Burton. A house in the country becomes surrounded by a growing city.

**Mike Mulligan and His Steam Shovel** - Virginia Lee Burton. Together they dig deep canals for boats to travel through, cut mountain passes for trains, and hollow out cellars

for city skyscrapers. When newer machines come, they must work harder to prove they are not meant for the scrap heap.

**Miss Rumphius** - Barbara Cooney. A desire to travel and make the world a more beautiful place.

**Big Cat, Little Cat** - Elisha Cooper. Simple and joyful domestic routines underscore the deeply entwined lives of two feline companions and the impact of loss on one.

**Thunder-Boomer!** - Shutta Crum. Summer storm brings an unexpected gift.

**Big Words for Little People** - Jamie Lee Curtis. Big sister teaches important words.

**The Day the Crayons Quit** - Drew Daywalt. Duncan wants to color but instead finds letters from the crayons all saying they quit!

**The Day the Crayons Came Home** - Drew Daywalt. Duncan now finds a whole new group of crayons asking to be rescued.

**Strega Nona** - Tomie dePaola. When Strega Nona leaves him alone with her magic pasta pot, Big Anthony is determined to show the townspeople how it works.

**Strega Nona's Harvest** - Tomie dePaola. Strega Nona attempts to teach Big Anthony about gardening and the importance of order. But when Big Anthony does not follow her directions and tries to use her growing spell, his small vegetable patch turns into an unruly jungle!

**Gaston** - Kelly DiPucchio. What does it take for a bulldog to fit in with his proper poodle family?

**The Jelly Donut Difference: Sharing Kindness with the World** - Maria Dismondy. The ooey goey jelly donuts in this story are a testament to the power of kindness, caring, and generosity.

**A Hat for Mrs. Goldman: A story About Knitting and Love** - Michelle Edwards. A celebration of winter mitzvahs, or kind deeds.

**Let's Do Nothing!** - Tony Fucile. Two boys run out of things to do with hilarious results.

**Night Lights** - Susan Gal. Biking at night, a child sees different types of illumination.

**The Night Gardener** - Terry Fan. William and an elderly gardener help transform their town by creating anonymous topiary artwork.

**Lights Out** - Aurthur Geisert. Little piglet overcomes fear of the dark.

**Wemberly Worried** - Kevin Henkes. Wemberly worries about everything. Big things, little things, and when school was about to start, Wemberly worried even more.

**Chrysanthemum** - Kevin Henkes. A book to talk about feelings.

**Goldilocks and Just One Bear** - Leigh Hodgkinson. Little Bear finds himself lost in the Big City.

**Little Red Writing** - Joan Holub. A brave little red pencil sets out to write an exciting story.

**Flora and the Flamingo** - Molly Idle. Flora and her graceful flamingo friend explore the trials and joys of friendship.

**Peter's Chair** - Ezra Jack Keats. Peter has a new baby sister. First his parents paint his old cradle. Now they want to paint his chair!

**The Snowy Day** - Ezra Jack Keats. Small Boy experiences the joy of snow.

**Lucy Goes to the Country** - Joseph Kennedy. Madcap adventures ensue when a gay couple and their cat spend the weekend in the country.

**This Is Not My Hat** - Jon Klassen. A tiny fish knows it's wrong to steal a hat.

**A Very Special House** - Ruth Krauss , Maurice Sendak. Free spirited story about a boys imaginary house.

**The Carrot Seed** - Ruth Krauss. A simple story of a boy's unwavering faith that the seed he plants and cares for will grow into a carrot.

**Matthew's Dream**- Leo Lionni. Matthew the Mouse has a moment of self discovery.

**Swimmy**- Leo Lionni . Swimmy shows his friends how—with ingenuity and team work—they can overcome any danger.

**Pezzettino**- Leo Lionni. Pezzettino learns he belongs to himself.

**The Story Of Ferdinand** - Munro Leaf. All the other bulls would run and jump and butt their heads together. But Ferdinand would rather sit and smell the flowers.

**Pete the Cat and His Four Groovy Buttons** - Eric Litwin. A mellow-eyed feline looks for the bright side of every situation.

**The Book of Mistakes** - Corinna Luyken. Stunning illustrations illuminate the creative process about how mistakes are not always negative and can open the door to a bigger picture.

**Otis and the Scarecrow**- Loren Long. Otis lets the scarecrow know he is part of the family.

**Elmer**- David McKee. Elmer the elephant, a colorful character because of his patchwork hide and sense of humor, tries to blend in with the herd but soon realizes he's happiest just being himself.

**Freckleface Strawberry** - Julianne Moore. Young girl doesn't like her freckles until she learns to live with them and accept herself.

**The Monsters' Monster** - Patrick McDonnell. A very big monster shows three very bad little monsters the power of gratitude.

**I STINK!** - Kate & Jim McMullan. With ten wide tires, one really big appetite, and an even bigger smell, this truck's got it all.

**I Got the Rhythm** - Connie Schofield-Morrison. A neighborhood walk becomes so much more as a little girl explores the music and sound of everyday urban life.

**Blueberries for Sal** - Robert McCloskey What happens when Sal and her mother meet a mother bear and her cub.

**Make Way for Ducklings** - Robert McCloskey. Tale of mallard ducks in Boston.

**Hi, Koo! A Year of Seasons** - Jon J. Muth. Koo the panda is back and discovering each season through poetry.

**Enemy Pie** - Derek Munson. This character learns how to get rid of an enemy and figures out a lot about friendship in the process.

**Ducks Don't Wear Socks** - John D. Nedwidek. Duck helps serious girl have fun.

**Miss Moore Thought Otherwise: the Story of the Lady Who Made Libraries for Children** -Jan Pinborough. The true story of how Miss Moore created the first children's room at the New York Public Library.

**The Grasshopper & the Ants** - Jerry Pinkney. The third in his retellings of Aesop's Fables, Pinkney shows the grasshopper why the ants have worked so hard, and the ants learn the value of sharing.

**I Wish You More** - Amy Rosenthal. Wishes for curiosity and wonder, for friendship and strength, laughter and peace.

**This Plus That: Life's Little Equations** -Amy Rosenthal. Simple math in life.

**Pig Kahuna** - Jennifer Sattler. Fergus is afraid to go in the water.

**Jangles: A Big Fish Story** - David Shannon. A boy comes face-to-face with a gigantic trout.

**A Sick Day for Amos McGee** - Philip C. Stead. Animals take care of their friend.

**Lenny & Lucy** - Philip C. Stead. Peter uses his imagination and pillows to create Lenny, the Guardian of the Bridge, and realizes that something is missing—a friend for Lenny.

**Interrupting Chicken** - David Ezra Stein. Story about a chicken who can't help interrupting during bedtime stories.

**The Dark** - Lemony Snicket. Mostly, the dark lives in the basement, but one night, when his night-light fails, it arrives in Laszlo's room.

**Life on Mars** - Jon Agee. A young astronaut is sure there is life on Mars. When he goes on a mission there he finds someone has eaten his cupcakes.

**The Lonely Phonebooth** - Peter Ackerman. This is the story of one of the last remaining phone booths in New York City, on the corner of West End Avenue and 100th Street.

**The Curious Garden** - Peter Brown. One boy's quest for a greener world... one garden at a time.

**Iggy Peck, Architect** - Andrea Beaty. Iggy loves building. However his creative expression is challenged when his 2d grade teacher declares her dislike of architecture.

**Rosie Revere Engineer** - Andrea Beaty. Rosie wants to build a contraption that flies but when it doesn't succeed her aunt insists it is a success and she should not quit.

**Ada Twist, Scientist** - Andrea Beaty. Scientist Ada is imaginative, curious, and unafraid of failure. She conducts scientific experiments to make discoveries but this time they lead to more stink and get her into trouble.

**Wolf in the Snow** - Matthew Cordell. A girl and a wolf cub each get lost in the snow and rescue each other.

**The Black Book of Colors** - Menena Cottin. Imagine not having sight and using Braille.

**Martina the Beautiful Cockroach: A Cuban Folktale** - Carmen Agra Deedy. Bug picks mate.

**Last Stop on Market Street** - Matt de la Pena. Every Sunday after church, CJ and his grandma ride the bus across town where she helps him see the fun of their routine and the beauty of the world around them.

**Front Porch Tales and North Country Whoppers** - Tomie dePaola. Laugh-out-loud stories from New Hampshire and Vermont are set during the four seasons of the year.

**The Night Gardener** - Terry Fan. Mysterious night gardener brings color to a boy and his town.

**A Taste of Colored Water** - Matt Faulkner. Girls learn what "colored" water means.

**Glass Slipper, Gold Sandal: A Worldwide Cinderella** - Paul Fleischman.

**Clever Jack Takes the Cake** - Candace Fleming. Boy tries to find a present fit for princess.

**My Two Dads (My Family)** - Claudia Harrington. With large exaggerated features, the characters in Harrington's book focuses on a family consisting of a second grade daughter, Jasmine or Jazz for short, and her two fathers who she calls Dad and Papi. Lenny, the class reporter and classmate, is visiting Jazz's home to interview and take photos to spotlight Jazz as the Student of the Week. Lenny soon discovers Jazz's family is not so different from his own.

**My Two Moms** - Claudia Harrington. My Two Moms is the story of a normal day in Elsie's life. When classmate Lenny visits her home, he discovers Elsie has two moms. Who gets her splinters out? Mommy! Who gets her cat out of the tree? Mom! Who reads to her? Mommy and Mom! Lenny realizes love makes a family.

**Year of Billy Miller** - Kevin Henkes. A funny story about friendship, sibling rivalry, and elementary school.

**Shaking Things Up** - Susan Hood. Introduction to 14 revolutionary women each paired with a noteworthy female artist.

**Lost and Found**- Oliver Jeffers . A poignant, funny, and child-friendly story about a boy and a penguin whose friendship is lost . . . and then found again.

**Lotus and Feather** - Ji-li Jiang. Inspired by the true story of a crane that rescued a Chinese village, a young girl and a crane help each other, become friends and save a village from a flood.

**Big Red Lollipop** - Rukhsana Khan. Tag-a-long little sister spoils girl's fun at a birthday party.

**Mama Went to Jail for the Vote** - Kathleen Karr. Girl learns about fight for right to vote.

**A Letter to Amy** - Ezra Jack Keats. Peter is inviting only one girl to his birthday party: his friend, Amy. He decides to send her a special invitation, but something happens on his way to mail it.

**Regards to the Man on the Moon** - Ezra Jack Keats. When the other kids make fun of Louie and call his father "the junkman," his dad explains that the so-called junk he loves "can take you right out of this world" with a little imagination.

**Do Unto Otters: A Book about Manners** - Laurie Keller. A delightfully illustrated tale demonstrated by the Otter family, of the importance of following the Golden Rule.

**Same, Same But Different** - Jenny Sue Kostecki-Shaw. Elliot lives in America, and Kailash lives in India. They are pen pals. By exchanging letters and pictures, they learn that they both love to climb trees, have pets, and go to school. Their worlds might look different, but they are actually similar. Same, same. But different! Through an inviting point-of-view and colorful, vivid illustrations, this story shows how two boys living oceans apart can be the best of friends.

**The Elephant Quilt** - Susan Lowell. Story of 1859 journey from Missouri to California.

**The Invisible Boy** - Trudy Ludwig. This story shows how small acts of kindness can make someone feel included.

**The Crane Girl** - Curtis Manley. Lyrical storytelling deftly interwoven with original haiku and an adaptation of popular Japanese folktales. A story of friendship and the power of kindness to transform lives.

**The Girl Who Thought in Pictures: The Story of Dr. Temple Grandin** - Julia Finley Moca. When young Temple was diagnosed with autism, no one expected her to talk, let alone become one of the most powerful voices in modern science.

**Zen Ties** - Jon Muth. What happens after helping a grouchy neighbor.

**If You Plant a Seed** - Kadir Nelson. A rabbit and his mouse pal are excited to harvest a few crops, but when the birds come to share in the spoils, rabbit and mouse have to make a decision. Will they plant seeds of selfishness or seeds of kindness?

**Red Butterfly: How Princess Smuggled the Secret of Silk out of China** - Deborah Noyes.

**A Different Pond** - Bao Phi, A story about a long ago fishing trip and the relationship between a father and son and old and new cultures.

**The Pea Blossom** - Amy Poole. Hans Christian Anderson tale from pea's perspective.

**Wabi Sabi** - Mark Reibstein. Cat living in Kyoto learns about the concept of beauty.

**The Dot** - Peter H. Reynolds. Here we find a young child who "can't draw" anything. Supposedly. But when the teacher gets our protagonist to draw a dot and then "sign it" - well, one thing leads to another and the dots become more and more elaborate.

**Ish** - Peter H. Reynolds. A creative spirit learns that thinking "ish-ly" is far more wonderful than "getting it right".

**The Sneetches and Other Stories**- Dr. Seuss. Four funny, easy to read stories with themes of tolerance, diversity and compromise.

**Hana Hashimoto, Sixth Violin**. Chieri Uegaki. A young girl has signed up to play the violin for the school's talent show but she has only had three lessons.

**Suki's Kimono** - Chieri Uegaki. A little girl whose spirit leads her to march and dance to her own drumbeat.

**The True Story of the Three Little Pigs** - Jon Scieszka, Young readers will finally hear the other side of the story of "The Three Little Pigs."

**How I Learned Geography** - Uri Shulevitz. Based on author's refugee childhood.

**Baker Cat** - Posy Simmonds. Overworked cat teams up with mice.

**Grandpa Green**- Lane Smith. Grandpa Green shows grandson a world of memories passed down in topiary shapes.

**Sylvester and the Magic Pebble** - William Steig. Sylvester finds a magic pebble that can make wishes come true. But when a lion jumps out at him on his way home, Sylvester is shocked into making a wish that has unexpected consequences. After overcoming a series of obstacles, Sylvester is eventually reunited with his loving family.

**Sugar Cane: A Caribbean Rapunzel** - Patricia Storage. New twist on classic tale.

**8 Class Pets + 1 Squirrel ÷ 1 Dog = Chaos** - Vivian Vande Velde. A group of small animals turn an elementary school into a real zoo.

**Mr. President Goes to School** - Rick Walton. Important lessons from kindergarten.

**Nanette's Baguette** - Mo Willems. A funny story about a little girl frog whose mom sends her to buy a baguette - but she ruins the errand by eating the irresistible baguette.

**What Do You Do With An Idea** - Kobi Yamada. Story of one brilliant idea and the child who helps to bring it into the world. As the child's confidence grows, so does the idea itself.

**Owl Moon** - Jane Yolen. Late one winter night a little girl and her father go owling. The trees stand still as statues and the world is silent as a dream. Whoo-who-who, the father calls to the mysterious nighttime bird. But there is no answer.

**Our Tree Named Steve** - Alan Zweibel. Father shares memories of tree in family yard.

**Happy Hair-Roe**, Mechal Renee. African American girls and their beautiful hair are celebrated in this bright, joyful read-together picture book that will have girls everywhere repeating the book's chorus- "I love being me!"

**Parker Looks Up: An Extraordinary Moment**-Curry, Parker. "When Parker Curry came face-to-face with Amy Sberald's transcendent portrait of First Lady Michelle Obama ...
